The first meeting of the Society of Automotive Historians was held on October 11, 1969, at the headquarters of the Antique Automobile Club of America. Mr. William S. Jackson made his offices available for this meeting. Coffee and doughnuts were provided by Mr. and Mrs. Jackson.

By default, G. M. Naul assumed the position of temporary chairman for the meeting. The agenda discussed was the listing as given in the October issue of the Newsletter.

The pros and cons of incorporation as a non-profit organization were discussed, and it was agreed that such a move at the present time was too expensive for our modest treasury, and that incorporation may take place at any time in the future when it seems to be desirable.

Guy P. Seeley volunteered to formulate a set of by-laws, to be submitted to the membership for approval, and his offer was accepted.

The question of qualification for membership was covered in some detail. The suggestion that publication of a work be made a prerequisite was not acceptable to the majority of those present. A motion was made, seconded and passed that a three-member membership committee be appointed. It was agreed that initial membership will run through December, 1970.

It was generally agreed that membership requirements should remain flexible and generally open. The membership committee is to be appointed by the forthcoming president.

The necessity for a temporary treasurer was recognized, and G. M. Naul was authorized to act as temporary treasurer.

A motion was made, seconded and carried that a nominating committee be formed by W. S. Jackson, H. A. Clark, Jr., and G. M. Naul to present a slate of nominees for the offices of president, vice-president, and secretary/treasurer. After adjournment, the committee nominated the following for office:

Henry Austin Clark, Jr., volunteered to make up a publicity release on the meeting, and distribute it to pertinent magazines, etc.

It was suggested by H. A. Clark, Jr., that the next meeting be held in Philadelphia at the February Annual Meeting of the Antique Automobile Club of America. (Feb. 20-21)

THE MAIL BAG - Letters from Members.

From Jacques Kupelian, 7 Sportlaan, Overyse (Brabant), Belgium:

I am very interested in your project of covering all information about motor vehicle history. I am interested in all kinds of vehicles, but more specialized about European Continental vehicles. If it will be of interest to American members, I can write some articles about the ancient Belgian automobile makes, about which I have a rather important documentation. I have a question to pose about the American "Rotary-Bournonville" car of 1922-1923; who is Eugène Bournonville, where was he working before and after the construction of his cars? I will also be very much interested to read about the Argentinian "Anasagasti" cars of 1912-1914. These cars were raced in France at this epoch and I believe that their engines were French ((Janvier, perhaps). I hope for a big future for the Society.

(Ed.) - Articles about the early Belgian and other European makes will be most welcome. The Society of Automotive Historians is international in scope, and presently has members in Canada, England, Belgium and Argentina, as well as the United States. Many of our members (your editor included) have a considerable amount of reference material on the American automobiles, but lack familiarity with the history of the cars of other nations.

THE ALSO-RANS - A residue from a number of lists of U. S. makes of automobiles.

One can turn up upon demand masses of information on the STEVENS-DURYEA, LOCOMOBILE or JORDAN, to name but three. It is possible to work down the scale through NORWALK, ARBENZ and PUNGS-FINCH. Each of these commands at least some sort of recognition from those familiar with the period from which these may be chosen. Should a scale of obscurity be established, eventually one reaches those barely discernable makes such as JEANNIN, JANNEY and IZZER. Beyond this region lies a vast residue of supposed makes which are almost devoid of information, other than a name.

Much of this "residue" was conveniently listed merely as names and dates as "Additions" by G. R. Doyle in his "The World's Automobiles". The Brigham's "Road to Yesterday" attempted to shed some light on these through requests for information on these "Mystery Makes". A few of them were subsequently dealt with in Nick Georgano's "The Complete Encyclopedia of Motor Cars".

It would seem that the Newsletter should make a good forum to investigate those makes whose existence is not beyond question. The following listing of reported makes is a compilation from a number of lists, rosters, etc., and they should be looked at critically and with suspicion. If information is available to support their existence, it it would be appreciated if the author would fill in any gaps in the information and forward to the Newsletter. This list is to be a critical one, and each make should be suspect until some verification is unearthed.

Portions of this list will be published in each forthcoming issue of the Newsletter, as space permits.

The task of compiling a complete and accurate roster of automobiles made since the beginning of the industry is an overwhelming one. Thousands of makes have appeared in various parts of the world, and now, at this late date, much of the information about them has been lost. On the other hand, a great deal of such information has been preserved in publications which are still readily available.

In almost all cities of any size the local public library has city directories back to 1890 or earlier. If the name of a particular company is known, it is a simple matter to trace an automobile company's life span from its first year to its last. Many city directories list businesses by products in a section separate from the regular alphabetical listings. In the very early books, auto makers may be listed under "Manufacturers" and further classified under "Automobiles" Later editions list them under "Automobiles - Manufacturing". Such listings often turn up very obscure makes.


Once the name of an automobile manufacturing concern has been found, the regular listings in the directory will usually provide the names of the officers of the company, and, unless the names are Smith, Brown, Jones, etc., a modern telephone directory will frequently list the names of the descendants of these people, and a dozen or so phone calls will often put you in touch with a son or grandson of a former small-time auto maker - and they are delighted to tell you what they know.

The big, thick volumes of 'Moody's Industrials", also available at most libraries, frequently offer much historical detail in connection with the accounts of the financial doings of long extinct manufacturers.


Another (but time-consuming) source of material is the micro-filmed newspaper file, also at the library. However, this involves scanning every page of each day's paper, skipping lightly over the comics, sport sections and society pages. However, just to check a couple of months of such pages takes an hour or so - and it is not easy to refrain from stopping to check other items than the business at hand.

In almost every roster of cars, certain errors are duplicated - which indicates that quite a few historians are using someone else's homework - and an error in one list is repeated in others. If you have found such errors, send your information to the Newsletter. In this way our organization can eventually produce the most complete and accurate listing yet published.

As a starter, look at any roster you may have at hand and check the dates of the Primo. It is a safe bet that your list will say Primo Motor Co., Atlanta, Ga. 1906-15. Thorough checking on this one (by the library method mentioned above) has led to the establishment of the correct dates (1910-1912), plus a long conversation with the grandson of the president of Primo, who provided the name of a truck (Van Winkle) made by his grandfather after the Primo venture failed.
